Rights Committee Annual Report



- Met with Ken Stead, local pharmacist, to discuss the use of psychotropic medications.
- 26 people met with the Committee and 11 additional people had updates provided to the Committee.
- There was a total of 2 new restrictions and 1 resumed restriction.
- There were 2 lifted restrictions.
- There were 42 rights extensions (25% were for psychotropic medications).

The Finish Line (Really the Starting Point!)

- Personal Outcome Measures® data

- Confirm final details of the accreditation week with participants and ensure all information has been collected and we are ready to go!!

3 - 4 Months Before Accreditation

- The CQL Consultant will work with us to finalize the activities and focus groups for Basic Assurances® during the onsite visit and coordinate the Personcentered Excellence activities for Accreditation
- Select the team of people (staff, board, people supported, family members and community members) who will participate in the accreditation process and provide them detailed information
- Identify key people who will be participating in the basic assurances validation

- Complete Basic Assurances Self– Assessment of the 46 mandatory indicators
- Continue to gather Personal
 Outcome Measures interview data
 and analyse data



HIGHLIGHTS AND ACTIVITIES




- The Support Plan Committee has developed a process evaluating our planning process and providing feedback to staff teams starting in June 2013.

Honouring Yesterday and Celebrating Today...

In October 1972, the Andrew Donaldson Developmental Centre opened at 30 Bell Lane, Brantford, providing a nursery school for children with a developmental disability.



"The exciting part about being involved in the opening of the Andrew Donaldson Developmental Centre was the parent involvement. There were hundreds of parents as members at that time and we were passionate and we all worked toward a common goal for our children." ~ A founding parent member, Monica Cremona.

With new community supports providing nursery school to all children in the community, the Andrew Donaldson

Developmental Centre closed in 1993. The agency continued supporting children through the development and operations of a Professional Resource Centre for educators and parents working with all children up to 12 years. The P.R.C., which opened in 1994, became an invaluable resource for families, educators and caregivers and continues today as part of the OEYC: Brant. In 2010, the OEYC moved main

locations to the old Andrew Donaldson Developmental Centre on Bell Lane. Services are provided for educators working with children prenatal to 12 years of age and services for parents and their children prenatal to 6 years of age.







