# QUALITY ENHANCEMENT COMMITTEE AND COUNCIL ON QUALITY AND LEADERSHIP PERSON-CENTRED EXCELLENCE ACCREDITATION

Community Living Brant is very proud to have achieved a four (4) year Person-Centred Excellence® Accreditation through The Council on Quality and Leadership (CQL), a recognized international leader in defining and measuring quality of life for people with disabilities and in those organizations who support them.

Over the past year, the focus of the Quality Enhancement Committee was preparation for our Person-Centred Excellence Accreditation with CQL. This included:

 Draft presentations from all 10 Basic Assurances working groups. This allowed the groups to share their evidence and answer questions that would be posed by CQL during their visit.



- Review and analysis of our Personal Outcomes Measures
- Review of Shared Values Report to CQL
- Discussion around future Strategic Directions that would be chosen as part of the Accreditation process using CQL's 8 Person-Centred Excellence Factors.

Community Living Brant chose to have an independent body measure the quality of its support because we believe in continually enhancing our services.



We have a long-standing commitment using CQL's Personal Outcomes Measures as our tool for planning for people, as well as our measure of quality of life and quality of services for people. Through the CQL Accreditation process conducted November 16 to 20, 2015, we were given the opportunity to review and assess supports provided through Person-Centred Excellence and the impact of these supports on the personal quality of life of the people receiving them.



We brought together employees, people receiving supports and their families, community supporters and Board members for strategic thinking, interactive dialogue, and action planning. Community Living Brant concluded the 5-day onsite review with organization-wide Strategic Directions, "The What Really Matters Plan", which identifies resources, timeframes for implementation and measures of accomplishment over the next four years.

The three Strategic Directions chosen from the Person -Centred Excellence Factors by our agency:

#### 1. COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS

Everyone will have socially valued roles. This builds leadership capacity, self-worth, and full citizenship for people.

#### 2. SUPPORTS AND SERVICES

People will have individualized self-directed supports and valued lives.

## 3. EMERGING PRACTICES IN INDIVIDUALIZED BUDGETS

Creation of a person-centred system that supports individualized budgets linked to people and their outcomes/goals.

The commitment to these Strategic Directions formulates our Agreement with CQL to meet the required validation over the four-year term. More detailed work plans will be created for each of the three chosen Directions, which will be monitored by the Quality Enhancement Committee over the next four years.

## **Rights Committee**

## Over the past year....

- 29 people receiving supports met with the Committee to review new restrictions or restriction extensions.
- 2 new people had psychotropic medication restrictions presented.
- 4 new restrictions were presented and all were for psychotropic medications.
- 3 restrictions were lifted.
- 2 Behaviour Support Plans were ended, and at this time, there are no approved Behaviour Support Plans in our agency!
- 1 additional End Report was for a psychotropic medication.
- 44 rights extensions of which 50 % were for psychotropic medications.
- The Committee welcomed Jamie Hitchon as its newest community member.



## Parents Group

### Over the past year .....

- A great evening event was held with John Lord called "Towards a New Story for People with Disabilities and Families". John is a community researcher and a parent who helps families learn about community connections, expanding social networks and plan for a meaningful future for their family member outside the service world.
- Mary Kealy, from Ireland, joined parents one evening to share stories of her work in shifting supports and services from congregate, segregated settings to helping people have an inclusive, meaningful good life with the support of their families. Mary shared great stories about her work with people and families in Ireland.

Committee members continue to develop leadership skills both within Community Living Brant and within our community.

#### Working Together To Make Change

Talked with the students in the Careers Classes at North Park and Caledonia High Schools about working in developmental services.

Talked with the post-secondary students at Laurier who were studying advocacy and rights for people with disabilities.

Talked with first year Bachelor of Social Work students at Laurier about supporting people with a developmental disability to live valued, connected lives.



Played a leadership role during the Accreditation process: participated in Basic Assurances groups, participated in a self-advocate session with the Reviewers, and full participation in planning for future direction of our agency.

#### **Looking Ahead**

**C**ontinue to update the educational video used to provide training to staff and persons supported.

**C**ollaborate with Employment Supports in organizing an Employment Workshop in 2017.

**C**ontinue to educate students about the "R" word.

**H**ost an information and networking session with other self-advocates this summer or fall.

**C**ontinue to work on gathering and preparing information to write a book about supports. This will be used to educate staff.

**The Ontario Early Years Centre: Brant** provides program and services free of charge to parents and their children ages 0-6 years. Each year, we partner with over 140 agencies/ programs to deliver workshops, events and programs to thousands of parents and children. OEYC: Brant serves as the lead for our community and continues to train Early Childhood Educators in Triple P (Positive Parenting Program), as well as Mindfulness Training. Both these programs have been well received in Brantford and we receive dollars through Capacity Funding.





Our community is one of 45 across
Ontario proudly taking part in the
Healthy Kids Community Challenge to
promote children's health through physical activity and healthy eating. Research
shows that being active every day is

essential for growing children. Good things happen when our kids move more, including having more self-confidence, stronger bodies and being better students! The theme of the Healthy Kids Community Challenge is "Run. Jump. Play. Every day." The OEYC: Brant has received grants to provide workshops and programs to children, families, and educators in the Brant County and the City.

#### Fostering Brant's Growth in Early Learning

builds on a foundation in Brant of quality programs in early learning and child care. The intent is to build upon the philosophy of supporting the whole child as part of a family and community. It encourages self-reflection, critical study/analysis through discussion, and ongoing collaboration. There is learning among educators by engaging with families, using pedagogical documentation and continued professional learning. In December 2015, Early Learning and Parenting Agencies had a successful first Peer to Peer Review. It proved to be a great learning experience.

18<sup>th</sup> Annual CHANGE Early Learning and Child Care Conference was a success again this year. It was attended by Early Learning Professionals from across the province.

Over 180 participants registered for Friday and Saturday.



Developed many new educational workshops both online and at the Centre for the early learning community, educators, and parents and children in the use of the new tool developed by the

Ministry of Education called *How Does Learning Happen; Ontario's Pedagogy for the Early Years (HDLH)* - a process of critical reflection, learning, and growth and is the basis of high-quality programs that continuously improve and create contexts that are meaningful for the children and families/caregivers they serve.


